MAYOR'S MESSAGE

In recent years the issue of housing affordability has assumed increasing importance for

municipal governments. In 2015, the Capital Regional District (CRD) released updated research respecting the increasing gap between housing needs and housing availability across this Region.

Building on this information, our local MLA and representatives from North Saanich, Central Saanich, and Sidney worked with the Community Social Planning Council of Greater Victoria to produce the Saanich Peninsula Affordable Housing Needs Assessment Report.

The report shows that on the Peninsula, 42% of households have annual family incomes of \$60,000 or less. For these families housing affordability is a major This is particularly challenge. so as the report indicates that over 96% of the housing supply available on the Peninsula is in a price range affordable to those with moderate to high incomes. This is out of reach for lower income families. Further research statistics show that simply upzoning areas to higher density, even to urban levels, does not provide affordability without measures included to ensure affordability

Since 2005 North Saanich, together with other regional municipalities, has contributed financially to efforts to provide more affordable and below market housing options in the Capital Region. Also, our Council has been working with staff for some time to assess the future of housing development in our municipality. We have adopted a number of policies to encourage affordable housing. These include permitting secondary suites, guest cottages, and carriage housing on suitable properties. In addition, North Saanich already has a modest number of subsidized affordable housing dwellings, approximately 100 units, occupied by families, seniors, and special needs residents.

A key objective of our Official Community Plan provides that the District of North Saanich will "ensure that the longterm residential development of the community will retain the character of current neighbourhoods while responding to the need for senior and affordable family housing".

Consequently, on February 27, 2017 Council considered options in working toward an affordable housing policy, regarding Areas 1 and 2 created during the last Council term. It adopted a motion restrict new development to proposals to those which exclusively provide affordable housing through recognized affordable housing providers. Council ratified this motion on March 6, 2017.

Needless to say, working through these decisions is a complex matter. It will continue to occupy Council's attention for some time to come.

FAREWELL TO DENHAM TILL HOUSE

The District will be wishing a fond farewell to the Denham Till house. The Denham Till house was built in 1928. The park and house have historic value to the District for their link to long-time residents Fredrick Denham Till and his wife Dora Madeline Till. The property, a generous gift to the citizens of North Saanich, was bequeathed for the purpose of preserving the land as a public park. The field was to be used as a playground for children and the fruit and nut trees were to be preserved for the enjoyment of the public. Although it was also suggested that the house could be used for a park employee or caretaker, the intended and actual public value in the property is largely in the

land rather than in the house.

Council has been aware for some time of the need to repair and upgrade the Denham Till house. As a result, in 2014, Consulting Engineers were engaged to complete a Building Condition Assessment (BCA) for the Denham Till house. The intent of the BCA was to review and assess the present condition of the building and provide recommendations for repairs and upgrades to assure the continued life of the building and make certain the building was in compliance with the latest BC Building Code requirements. Subsequent to the BCA, the District commissioned a Capital Asset Management Plan, Change in Use Feasibility Assessment, and prepared a Denham Till Residence Residential Renovation Project tender package.

In March 2016, Council approved a \$150,000 budget for repairs to the structure and upgrades to the interior of the Denham Till Park house for use as a residential rental. The identified works were put out to tender and qualified contractors were invited to bid on the project. Only a single bid was received with a total cost of \$340,000 net of taxes.

Council authorized removal of the Denham Till Residence from the property due to the deteriorated condition of the building, the costly renovations required, the prospect of continuing to rent the property at a loss, and the District staff time and resources expended to maintain and manage the house. The land will continue to be used as a park as was the original intent of the bequeathment.

Council has directed staff to develop and implement a tree maintenance program for the property and seek public input on storyboards and ideas on future use of the house site. STRATEGIC PLAN UPDATE

Council's 2015 to 2018 Strategic Plan was updated and approved on April 3. It is an important document that Council uses to establish goals and objectives to achieve during its term. By adopting the Strategic Plan, Council sets direction for staff to undertake specific activities and projects designed to achieve the goals and objectives of the plan.

The Strategic Plan articulates Council's vision and mission statement for the community. It identifies the core services and sets out specific strategic priorities. Readers can review the achievements in each year of the plan timeframe in the "report card" included at the end of the plan.

Some highlights for 2017 strategic priorities include:

- Providing a facility for Pickleball users;
- Implementing the Sandown Agreement;
- Providing an enhanced emergency operation centre;
- Preparing a business continuity plan for municipal operations;
- Undertaking Canada 150 celebration; and
- Implementing the corporate asset management plan.

JUBILEE PARK CROWDFUNDING APPEAL

In August 2015, Council decided to proceed with the phased development of a new children's playground at Jubilee Park. The park was envisioned to have an aeronautical theme and will be developed in four major phases.

The District has already received some generous corporate donations from Viking Air (\$25,000); VIH Aviation (\$6,000); Victoria Airport Authority (\$5,000); Coast Capital Savings (\$2,500) and Sea Span Ferries (\$500). North Saanich has also received a Canada 150 Grant from the Federal Government of \$60,100, which will be matched by the District.

The District is still approximately \$44,000 short of what is needed to complete Phase 1 and 2 of the park. Council decided to try something different and raise the remaining money using a brand new community crowdfunding platform called Wayblaze.

The money raised will allow the District to complete construction of Phase 1 and 2 of the park that includes the children's playground and an impressive giant aircraft themed structure.

BURNING SEASON CLOSURE

On May 6, 2017 at sunset, all outdoor burning was banned within the District of North Saanich. This includes burning in incinerators, fire pits, and open piles until further notice. The only exception

is chimineas and outdoor fire appliances with a permit, which can be obtained by contacting the Fire Department.

The North Saanich Emergency Program has engaged the **Emergency Response Management** corporation Services (ERMS) to provide an Emergency Mass Notification System to the residents of North Saanich. The system, in real time, will be used to communicate with residents and stakeholders in the event of emergencies and disasters, such as earthquakes, tsunami alerts, evacuation notices, or other safety threats.



NEW PICKLEBALL COURTS

The District will soon have four new pickleball courts at Wain Park. The courts will be to the east of the parking lot along Birch Road. Construction began in April. Removal of the topsoil layer, construction of the subbase for the courts, and provision of sub-drains were completed by the District. Asphalt paving of the court surface and installation of the fencing is anticipated to be completed in May/June. Painting and completion of the courts as well as final landscaping is scheduled for July. Once applied, the paint will require a few weeks to cure before the courts can be opened for public use sometime in August.
